A Memorial Tribute . . .

The impact one life can have on a community can be incredible. In 2009, two supporters of Hope House Rescue Mission died. We'd like to honor their memory by sharing our version of their stories with you.

In 2002, when the doors of Hope House were doomed to close, **Dr. Lloyd Guild** began supporting the mission. His faithful donations gave the financial stability the shelter needed to keep them open. At first, the funds were used to pay the salary of the interim executive director. After the interim executive director left, and over the course of the last seven years, Dr. Guild's Foundation continued to contribute to Hope House's general fund.

Dr. Lloyd Guild died on October 23, 2009, at the age of 89 years. The following information was included in his obituary. Dr. Guild made a career out of developing devices capable of detecting dangerous chemicals, such as anthrax. He founded SKC Inc., an international manufacturer of instruments that sample and sniff out contaminants and hazardous materials. He started the company out of his home basement in Bethel Park, Pennsylvania. SKC now has six offices worldwide, and their products were used at ground zero in New York City to measure hazardous chemicals after the 9-11 terrorist attacks. Products he designed have also been sent into space by the European Space agency.

According to his family, Dr. Guild was a devout Christian and helped finance numerous schools and seminaries. Words are inadequate to express the gratitude of Hope House Rescue Mission to the Lloyd Guild Charitable Foundation for its generosity and all that it has enabled us to accomplish over the last nine years.

Ed Gaker spent many hours volunteering at Hope House Rescue Mission. According to employee Steve Sparks, he started coming to serve at the shelter with his church youth group, but continued to volunteer on his own for many years. Ed didn't just come to help in the kitchen; he enjoyed getting to know the people staying here. Steve said that Ed never accepted the "status quo." He wanted to discover things for himself and was always an active participant. Ed gave 100% of himself to whatever he was doing at Hope House and continued to stop in even after he went away to college.

Ed Gaker died on June 5, 2009, at the age of 23, in an accident on a river in Hinsdale County, Colorado, while pursuing his passion for kayaking. The Gaker Family used the tragic circumstance of his death to bless the people at Hope House Rescue Mission.

Although these men were in different seasons of their lives, their passionate hearts were connected in the way that they cared for people. Hope House was privileged to have known them and grateful for the countless lives that were changed because of their contributions.

The number of individuals served by Hope House Rescue Mission, Inc. in 2009 was reduced by more than 100 people for the following reason. We have discovered that breaking the cycle of homelessness takes time. Hope House has emerged as a true rescue mission, providing not only emergency shelter, but striving to empower homeless individuals who struggle with addiction and mental illness to regain control of their lives and to reintegrate into society. Since homelessness is the result of a combination of circumstances or decisions made over a long period of time, a more comprehensive, strategic plan of action is needed to move these families and individuals forward into self-sufficiency. This process begins with an assessment and is only achieved over time through comprehensive case management, addiction recovery, primary and mental health treatment, and facilitation of other social services.

In August 2009, Hope House Rescue Mission began offering classes entitled Life Management, Employment Skills/Computer Skills, Self-Worth, Coping Skills, Feelings, Anger and Spirituality. These informative classes are helping residents recognize problem areas in their lives and empowering them with the tools to move forward, becoming whole in every aspect of their lives: emotionally, mentally, physically, financially and spiritually.

In 2010, Hope House will expand its ministry by opening the Center of Hope for Women and Children. Hopefully the number of individuals and families housed by the mission will increase, but the most important factor remains to be the depth of assistance; which will be the solution to permanent and positive life changes.
